

Now is the perfect time for you to join the Ivan Franko Ukrainian Book Club! All members of UCSIF are welcome. We meet 4 times a year and through our readings we have met unforgettable characters, shared incredible experience and have travelled extensively in time and space.

Our selections are Ukrainian books translated into English or books written in English on Ukrainian themes and topics. They reflect a variety of genres: mystery, thriller, humorous and historical novels; memoirs; classic Ukrainian in translation; poetry, plays and even movies. Some of the books reduced us to puddles of laughter, while others brought upon a stillness born of empathy and reflection.

We all did not always agree on each other's interpretations or evaluations of the books, but we certainly enjoyed the spirited discussions and learned a lot about what it means to be Ukrainian.



Current Read

We met in May to discuss Oles Berdnyk's *Prometheus*. The evening was filled with the usual animated discussion and friendly sparring. We agreed that this book appealed mainly to readers who enjoy studies in comparative religions, philosophy, and Greek and Roman mythology. The love story between Hypatia and Isadore added a tender dimension to the often grim and despondent attempt to unravel the mystery of the fire that burned within them.

19th and beginning of the 20th century nursed the newly rekindled flame of Ukrainian consciousness. There were some surprising religious pronouncements and thought provoking revelations.

We decided that the main premise of the book was the notion that "truth lies within you, and that this truth shall set you free" and that it was this premise that contributed to Berdnyk's books being banned by the Soviet authorities.

In September we will discuss For the Home Hearth by Ivan Franko. This short novel from the book Behind Decorum's Veil reads like an Arthur Conan Dole / Edgar Allan Poe mystery. The plot unravels slowly and characters develop convincingly. It is beautifully written, masterfully translated and thoroughly enjoyable to read. Even though it was written 1892, parts are hauntingly contemporary.

There are more readers of *Ukrainian Vancouver* in Ukraine than in Canada. It gives us an opportunity to influence Ukrainian politics back in our Motherland. Through the newspaper we can share Canadian values with our brothers and sisters in Ukraine.

As you see, the idea is great, it is working and it is a success. The newspaper is officially registered as a small business in BC.
